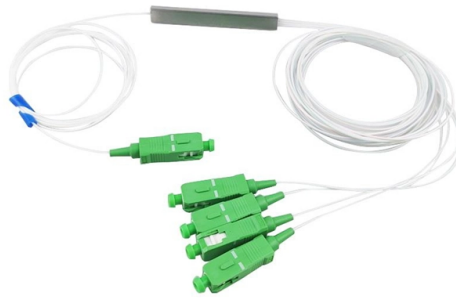


What does FTTB mean in fiber optic communication systems
